Public contracting a bacterial infection through contact with animals, or transferring contamination into a non contact area.	Keeping walk ways clear & wiping down animal containment area. Trip briefing to alert all teachers and students of the hazards of coming into contact with animals. Showing everyone where the washing facilities are, and highlighting the responsibilities the Teachers have to ensure the safety of the children in their care, also agreeing what part they would like Highfields staff to take in supervising the children. The farm is divided into contact and non contact areas with wash facilities and clear signage.	Go through the pre trip briefing, regarding possible hazards that your group could encounter, and things to avoid whilst in the contact areas. Familarise yourselves where all the washing facilities are situated, and how you will supervise this. Ensure that all cuts will be coverd with a plaster before arriving. Discuss roles and responsibilites in your pre visit, making note of the contact and non contact areas.

Signage to advise that all play areas are to be used with Adult supervision, and that areas are freely available, but Adult supervision to be present. Keeping areas clean and controlled, and regular checks of all play areas to be carried out. Advising Teachers to remember "cleaning of hands and footwear before entering the [play/(non contact) area".	Go through the pre briefing, checking the play areas available to you, and choose which ones you are going to allow your group to visit, then make arrangements to have enough Adult supervision when in these areas. Making note of where the wash facilities are, and making sure you have the correct number of staff to supervise hand washing.

The pre trip briefing will cover the safety aspects of the trailer.	Having a pre trip briefing advising everyone going on the trip of the rules when travelling on or getting on and off the trailer.
The Public when travelling on the trailer, falling over if standing up.	In the briefing and before setting off, the driver will advise all passengers to be seated at all times, especially when the trailer is moving. There will always be an assistant at the back with a whistle to comunicate with the driver in the event of a problem.	During the pre trip brief, all possible passengers to be advised that they are to remain seated at all times whilst the trailer is moving.
The Public when travelling on the trailer, if the driver is travelling too fast or breaks too hard.	We have tested the tractor and trailer in a variety of gears and speeds, and have decided upon a set of gears and engine revs as the maximum. Slower speed will be required when the Public are walking around the farm, or when we go on one of the fields. All drivers have received training and have signed a copy of this risk assessment to acknowledge they will adher to these speeds, and gearing. Gears: 3:2 on the tarmac, 1500 on the tarmac, Signed by: Tony Sellman, Ian Smith, and Roger Hosking.
